Appendix 2 Watford Borough Council Budget Survey 2010

Our country is in debt. The scale of the national debt means the Government will be asking all public sector organisations to find savings from their budgets or to increase charges to raise additional income. Watford Borough Council is anticipating having to find just over £4 million savings over the next 3 to 4 years. To put this in context, the council's total annual budget is currently around £16 million, so this will be just over a 25% reduction.

Watford is already one of the most efficient district councils in the country, having made over £12 million savings since the Mayor was elected in 2002. This means the council is already lean, so finding this level of extra savings will require some changes to how Watford Borough Council operates, and the level and range of services provided.

The managing director is looking at staffing levels and how the structure and organisation of the council could be adjusted in order to find savings. We would like the help of our residents to understand where budget reductions could be found from the services we currently provide.

You will notice that there are no options regarding our major projects such as the Colosseum, Charter Place redevelopment and Watford Health Campus. This is because these projects are funded through our capital budget - we are not allowed to use this money to finance the day-to-day running of the council.

All of the following options are under consideration, and your views would be appreciated.
