My objections to application 14/00 468/LAPRE for extension of the licensable activities listed for the Nascot Arms relate to the 'Prevention of Public Nuisance'

Background to my objections

o'the Nascot Arms is a small, popular public house located in a quiet, compact residential area opposite a children's play ground. The majority of housing is of the small terraced type, fronting directly onto the pavenent or with 1-2 m. depth of front garden.

The residences are arranged in two cul-de-sais off the narrow one-way Stamford Rd. Residents' parking occupies all but a very few spaces. (This has been very evident during the recent closure of the Nascot Arms)

· Street lighting is extinguished at midnight.

Objections

- The hours of operation applied for, ie to half-past midnight every day of the week, are inappropriately late for a quiet residential area. Three nearby equivalent establishments providing alcohol and/or food in Langley Rd and the St. Albans Rd do not find it necessary to operate such late hours (The Southern Cross 11.30pm, Lemon Grass 11.30pm, Nana's 10.30pm particularly from Sunday to Thursday.
- · There is already considerable noise pollution from the Nascot Arms as the designated smokers area appears to be on the pavements outside the pub.

This is added to by open windows, overspill customers and parents dinking on the pavement whilst keeping an eye on childrent playing across the road. It is hard to get away from this noise given the nature and layout of residences.

- The potential for this noise pollution to continue up to half-past midnight every hight of the week is unacceptable in a quiet vesidential area. Add to this cleaning up operations, the fact that not all customers leave promptly or quietly, and will now be leaving on unlit streets. Residents and their families have a right to sufficient sleep in order to be able to work and study effectively. The extension to the licensable activities for the Nascot Arms would certainly undervine this.
- The increased volume of cars needing parking space: as a result of increased operational hours would obviously decrease the chances of a resident being able to park close to home especially if returning late at night and possibly on unlit streets.

I believe that the Licensing Act does not presume that requests for extended hours should take precedence over legitimate residents concerns. I hope that this will continue to be the case.
